

ANOTHER COLOR VIDEO IS OFFERED TO BOARD

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (AP)—The problem of what to do about color television was complicated further today when Color Television Incorporated of San Francisco announced a "wholly new and unique" method called "Uniplex."

The Federal Communications Commission has been dealing with the problem for months. It supposedly is on the verge of announcing a decision among the color television inventions demonstrated by the Radio Corporation of America, the Columbia Broadcasting System, and Color Television Incorporated during nine months of hearings.

The California company said its new and second invention, certain details of which were brought to

completion "only last Saturday," is "believed to be superior to any other color television system."

Arthur S. Matthews, president of the firm, asked the commission to reopen the hearings and witness a demonstration of Uniplex.

This was the second new system announced since the hearings ended. About a month ago General Electric reported a new color plan wholly different from any other. It claims superior performance for this plan.

Color Television Incorporated said its new system is such that present black-and-white television sets will be able to receive color program in black and white. Furthermore the petition said: "Conversion of standard black and white receivers to color under the Uniplex system is practical through the use of a single, small, inexpensive unit in addition to a direct new tube."
