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Commerce Committee Will Call F. C. C. for Early Hearing

CAMDEN, N. J., Nov. 9—One of the first of the Government's regulatory bodies to be called before the House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee under the new Republican Administration will be the Federal Communications Commission, Representative Charles A. Wolverton said here today.

Representative Wolverton, a New Jersey Republican, will return to Washington on Jan. 3 as chairman of the powerful Commerce Committee. He said that one reason for calling the F. C. C. early was its ruling in favor of a color television process developed by the Columbia Broadcasting System. Another color process had been submitted for approval by the Radio Corporation of America, which has a plant here.

The color television ruling, Mr. Wolverton said, was an evidence of "too hasty decisions" on the part of "alphabetical autocrats." In a statement yesterday he said that Government regulatory agencies would be asked to justify "many of the restrictions they have been imposing under Democratic rule."
