COLOR TV SENT BY CABLE

R. C. A. Gives First Demonstration of All-Electronic System

In an experimental transmission from Washington, the Radio Corporation of America demonstrated for the first time yesterday that its all-electronic color television system can use standard coaxial cables to carry programs in color over long distances. The company showed simultaneously how ultrahigh-frequency radio relays can be employed to extend coverage from terminal stations.

During the demonstration, color signals from a special program originating at the studios of the National Broadcasting Company's television station WNBW in Washington were sent more than 200 miles over coaxial cable to NBC's station WNBC in New York.
